Featured Professor, Kean Birch

Prof Kean Birch transferred from the Department of Social Science to the Department of Geography in 2017. His research focuses on technoscientific capitalism – how knowledge and creativity are emerging as key assets and drivers of the economy. Prof Birch recently received funding for this research from a 5-year SSHRC Insight Grant. In the last few years, he has authored several books including *Neoliberal Bio-economies? The Co-construction of Markets and Natures* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2018), *A Research Agenda for Neoliberalism* (Edward Elgar,

2017), Business and Society: A Critical Introduction (with others, Zed Books, 2017), Innovation, Regional Development and the Life Sciences: Beyond Clusters (Routledge, 2016), and We Have Never Been Neoliberal: A Manifesto for a Doomed Youth (ZerO Books, 2015). He has also edited The Handbook of Neoliberalism (with Simon Springer & Julie MacLeavy, Routledge, 2016). We are excited to have him in our department where he can share his expertise about our changing economy in the classroom.
